While we cannot fully relate specifically to the pains the Lau's are experiencing, we understand the emotional toil a parent has over their child's well-being. It has brought an awareness of how precious our time with our children really is. We admire how resilient Dan and Minnie have been over this situation and as any caring parent, they are doing their very best to seek treatment to save their child.

It is our fervent hope that children like Matthew get to experience the fullness of life that we all take for granted. We urge you to consider funding this research.
