23	SMALL, BUT MIGHTY TEAM THAT LEADS AND SUPPORTS THE
24	ENTIRE AGENCY WITH VARIOUS MARKETING COMMUNICATIONS

22	FEDERAL DEVELOPMENTS. WE'RE ALL AWARE THERE HAVE

24	IMPLEMENTED, CAN HAVE DRASTIC EFFECTS ON THE
25	SCIENTIFIC COMMUNITY, INCLUDING MANY CIRM-FUNDED

3	OF THE DEVELOPMENTS THAT WE'VE BEEN FOLLOWING. I'LL
4	HAND IT OFF TO YOU, J.T.
5	DR. THOMAS: THANK YOU, ESTEBAN. MADAM
6	CHAIR, MADAM CO-CHAIR, MEMBERS OF THE SUBCOMMITTEE,
7	CIRM TEAM, AND MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC, BEFORE I GIVE
8	A FEW OPENING REMARKS, I WANTED TO LET THE
9	SUBCOMMITTEE KNOW THAT WE HAVE POSTED THE JOB
10	DESCRIPTION FOR THE SENIOR DIRECTOR OF
11	COMMUNICATIONS WHOSE PRINCIPAL RESPONSIBILITY WILL
12	BE TO DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT A COMPREHENSIVE
13	STRATEGIC COMMUNICATION PLAN TO REACH AND INFORM
14	CIRM'S MANY AND VARIED STAKEHOLDER GROUPS.
15	WE HAVE IN A SHORT TIME ALREADY RECEIVED
16	25 APPLICATIONS AND EXPECT MORE IN THE DAYS AHEAD.
17	WE'LL KEEP YOU POSTED AS THE PROCESS PROCEEDS.
18	IN THE TWO MONTHS SINCE THE NEW
19	ADMINISTRATION TOOK OFFICE, SEVERAL ACTIONS HAVE
20	RAISED SERIOUS CONCERNS ABOUT THE FUTURE OF
21	SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH IN THE UNITED STATES, INCLUDING
22	SIGNIFICANT FUNDING CUTS TO SCIENTIFIC INSTITUTIONS,
23	THE APPOINTMENT OF INDIVIDUALS TO KEY HEALTH AND
24	SCIENTIFIC PHYSICIANS WHO MAY NOT FULLY VALUE THE
25	IMPORTANCE OF SCIENCE, CHANGES TO FUNDING STRUCTURES

1	THAT COULD HINDER SCIENTIFIC PROGRESS, AND EFFORTS
2	TO BAN DEI PROGRAMS THAT COULD UNDERCUT THE
3	DEVELOPMENT OF TREATMENTS FOR UNDERSERVED
4	COMMUNITIES.
5	WE AT CIRM UNDERSTAND THE UNCERTAINTY
6	AROUND HOW THESE FEDERAL DEVELOPMENTS ARE IMPACTING
7	THE SCIENTIFIC AND PATIENT COMMUNITIES. THIS
8	AMBIGUITY CAN BE CHALLENGING, ESPECIALLY ON
9	RESEARCHERS AND INSTITUTIONS THAT RELY ON A STABLE
10	FUNDING ENVIRONMENT TO DRIVE SCIENTIFIC PROGRESS.
11	WE ARE CLOSELY MONITORING, WITH THE HELP
12	OF POLICY PARTNERS, THE EVOLVING LANDSCAPE IN
13	WASHINGTON, D.C. CIRM REMAINS RESOLUTE AND FULLY
14	COMMITTED TO SUPPORTING CALIFORNIA'S RESEARCH
15	COMMUNITY AND TO ADVANCING INNOVATIVE REGENERATIVE
16	MEDICINE THERAPIES TO PEOPLE ACROSS THE STATE.
17	LATER THIS MONTH THE BOARD WILL BE
18	CONSIDERING FOUR CONCEPT PLANS APPROVED LAST FALL AS
19	PART OF OUR STRATEGIC ALLOCATION FRAMEWORK.
20	APPLICATIONS FOR DISCOVERY, PRECLINICAL DEVELOPMENT,
21	AND CLINICAL PROGRAMS ARE EXPECTED TO OPEN IN THE
22	SPRING WITH DEADLINES THROUGHOUT THE SUMMER AND
23	FALL. COMBINED THIS FIRST ROUND OF FUNDING PROGRAMS
24	WILL PROVIDE MORE THAN 425 MILLION TO SUPPORT DOZENS
25	OF NEW CELL AND GENE THERAPY RESEARCH PROJECTS.

1	WITH PARTICULAR RESPECT TO DEI, IT HAS
2	LONG BEEN CIRM POLICY THAT THE ONLY WAY TO DEVELOP
3	CELL AND GENE THERAPIES FOR ALL CALIFORNIANS IS TO
4	MAKE SURE THAT CLINICAL TRIALS INVOLVE PATIENTS FROM
5	ALL AFFECTED COMMUNITIES. ACCORDINGLY, CLINICAL
6	GRANT APPLICATIONS ARE RIGOROUSLY JUDGED BOTH ON
7	SCIENTIFIC MERIT AND THE GAME PLAN TO RECRUIT AND
8	TREAT PATIENTS FROM ALL SUCH COMMUNITIES ON THE
9	SPECIFIC DISEASES UNDER REVIEW.
10	WE REMAIN FULLY COMMITTED TO ENSURING
11	DIVERSE REPRESENTATION IN ADDITION IN OUR EDUCATION
12	AND TRAINING PROGRAMS. THESE PROGRAMS ARE BUILDING
13	THE NEXT GENERATION OF SCIENTISTS AND INNOVATORS IN
14	THE STATE AND EQUIPPING THEM WITH THE SKILLS NEEDED
15	TO LEAD IN REGENERATIVE MEDICINE.
16	OUR INVESTMENT INTO THESE EDUCATION AND
17	MENTORSHIP OF THESE FUTURE SCIENTIFIC LEADERS IS
18	CRITICAL TO ENSURING PROGRESS IN THE FIELD.
19	THE PRINCIPLES BEHIND DEI PERMEATES ALL
20	THAT WE DO AT CIRM. WITHOUT A COMMITMENT TO THOSE
21	PRINCIPLES, WE ARE LESS EFFECTIVE IN OUR OVERALL
22	APPROACH.
23	CIRM STRONGLY OPPOSES THE DISCREDITING OF
24	SCIENCE AND THE ILL-ADVISED ATTEMPT TO STIFLE
25	SCIENTIFIC INGENUITY AND INNOVATION. WE ARE

1	FORTUNATE THAT THE CITIZENS OF CALIFORNIA HAVE GIVEN
2	US THE OPPORTUNITY AND PRIVILEGE TO CONTINUE TO LEAD
3	THE WAY IN ACCELERATING WORLD-CLASS SCIENCE AND
4	INTEND FULLY IN THE YEARS AHEAD TO DO JUST THAT. AS
5	WE EMBARK ON OUR THIRD DECADE, FACING AN UNCERTAIN
6	FEDERAL LANDSCAPE, WE'LL CONTINUE TO CHAMPION
7	REGENERATIVE MEDICINE IN CALIFORNIA AND CONTRIBUTE

5	THIS, OF COURSE, INCLUDES LAUNCHING EMAILS

8	SUPPORT LEADERSHIP'S VISION, AS WELL AS THE ENTIRE

10	I WILL BE PRESENTING A COMPREHENSIVE
11	COMMUNICATIONS STRATEGY IN RESPONSE TO THESE
12	DEVELOPMENTS AND TO OUTLINE HOW CIRM WILL THROUGH
13	ITS COMMUNICATION EFFORTS CONTINUE TO ENGAGE WITH
14	STAKEHOLDERS AND REINFORCE OUR MISSION IN LIGHT OF

16	SO AMIDST ALL OF THIS UNCERTAINTY, CIRM
17	HAS A UNIQUE OPPORTUNITY TO POSITION ITSELF AS A
18	PROACTIVE LEADER. OUR ROLE AS A KEY RESEARCH
19	FUNDER, OUR ADVOCACY FOR SCIENTIFIC INNOVATION, AND
20	OUR COMMITMENT TO DIVERSITY, EQUITY, AND INCLUSION
21	IN SCIENCE PUTS US IN A STRONG POSITION TO NAVIGATE
22	SOME OF THESE CHALLENGES. SO AT CIRM OUR MISSION TO
23	ACCELERATE WORLD-CLASS SCIENCE REMAINS UNSHAKEN, AND
24	THAT'S WHY OUR COMMUNICATION EFFORTS MUST REFLECT
25	THIS COMMITMENT.

1	SO OUR COMMUNICATIONS STRATEGY, WHICH WAS
2	PROVIDED TO YOU IN THE AGENDA, IS DESIGNED TO ENSURE
3	THAT WE MEET SEVERAL KEY OBJECTIVES. FIRST, WE WANT
4	TO EMPHASIZE CIRM'S LEADERSHIP ROLE IN REGENERATIVE
5	MEDICINE AND UNDERSCORE CALIFORNIA'S CRITICAL
6	POSITION IN ADVANCING SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH. WE WILL
7	ALSO REASSURE STAKEHOLDERS THAT CIRM'S STRATEGIC
8	IMPACT GOALS AND MISSION REMAIN UNCHANGED DESPITE
9	ALL OF THESE FEDERAL POLICY SHIFTS. WE WILL
10	EMPHASIZE THE VALUE OF SCIENCE AND THE ONGOING NEED
11	FOR INVESTMENT IN RESEARCH. WE'LL REAFFIRM CIRM'S
12	COMMITMENT TO INCLUSIVITY, EMPHASIZING THE
13	IMPORTANCE OF DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION IN DRIVING
14	SCIENTIFIC EXCELLENCE AND EQUITABLE ACCESS TO
15	THERAPIES. AND WE WILL CONTINUE TO MAINTAIN AND
16	DEEPEN OUR RELATIONSHIPS WITH KEY STAKEHOLDERS,

23	THROUGH OUR COMMUNICATIONS EFFORTS, WE
24	WILL REACH A WIDE RANGE OF AUDIENCES, INCLUDING CIRM

14	YOU SEE FIT.
15	A KEY TAKEAWAY THAT I HAVE NOTICED AND
16	THAT WE'VE NOTICED FROM RECENT CONVERSATIONS WITH
17	THE BOARD IS THAT WE REALLY NEED TO REAFFIRM THE
18	STRENGTH AND COMMITMENT OF OUR MISSION. AND WE CAN
19	DO THIS BY CONTINUING TO HIGHLIGHT OUR IMPACT IN
20	CALIFORNIA, HIGHLIGHTING THE RESEARCH WE FUND, AND
21	PROMOTING OUR FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES WIDELY TO THE
22	SCIENTIFIC COMMUNITIES THAT WE SUPPORT.
23	A KEY MESSAGE WE WANT TO EMPHASIZE, FOR
24	EXAMPLE, IS THAT CIRM'S MISSION IS STEADFAST AND
25	GROUNDED IN SCIENTIFIC INTEGRITY, PATIENT ACCESS,

6	SO USING THAT MESSAGE, FOR EXAMPLE, WE

9	IDENTIFIED IN THIS PLAN WHENEVER POSSIBLE. THAT'S
10	WHAT WE'RE GOING TO STRIVE TO DO THROUGH THESE

12	WE ALSO WANT TO HIGHLIGHT THAT CIRM
13	REMAINS COMMITTED TO CREATING AN INCLUSIVE AND
14	EQUITABLE RESEARCH ENVIRONMENT IN REGENERATIVE
15	MEDICINE, SUPPORTING RESEARCH THAT BENEFITS
16	UNDERREPRESENTED COMMUNITIES, AND ENSURING DIVERSITY
17	IN SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH OUTCOMES. SO THIS PRESENTS,
18	FOR EXAMPLE, AN OPPORTUNITY TO HIGHLIGHT MORE
19	STORIES FROM CIRM-FUNDED RESEARCH, CLINICAL TRIALS,

10	FUNDING DIABETES RESEARCH?

13	OFF A MAJOR 30-YEAR STUDY ON DIABETES AT THE NIH,
14	HUGE, HUGE, LONG-TERM STUDY ON DIABETES. MAYBE WE
